The besieged life doesn't cripple the fish's ability to bread and propagate within the only free space in the Gaza Strip. They definitely own themselves and no-one who soever administers, adopts or oversees them whereas they go into the water despite the survival tests most of the time.

Hundreds of fish species live in the Mediterranean while tens of these species are locked in the sea of this besieged city for over eleven years.

Fishermen sail up to six nautical miles to fish these species while the population of coastal cities live the best maritimes moments; the sea has not been friends with Gaza for years now.

This project is part of a series of photography projects that have been made this year entitled "Who turned the light off". I came across the statement sprayed in bold on a wall in the city which raises questions that faded away in our minds about demanding or advocating what we simply gave up dreaming of.

SALMA'S HOME is set in Jordan and revolves around three women with distinct personalities. SALMA (Juliet Awad) is a talented baker living alone in a large old house overlooking downtown Amman running a unprofitable home-based bakery, her daughter FARAH (Sameera Asir) is a young working mother with marital problems with husband Malek (Firas Taybeh). Their lives are disrupted by the death of Salma's ex-husband. The funeral takes place at his current wife's house, LAMIA (Rania Kurdi), an aspiring socialite who is obsessed with building her brand online. After the funeral, Uncle Emad (Waleed Jizawi) brings shocking facts to light leading to territorial clashes and finally forcing the three women to accept some harsh realities and take control of their lives.

When the news is patchy, unreliable, and follows inumerable international agendas, Palestinian Literature gives us powerful direct access to the impact and understanding of catastrophe and its long legacy.

This session shares writing from Gaza over the course of this latest atrocity, and reads it within its longer literary history. A far cry from the sense that silence is the most eloquent tribute to atrocity, Palestinian writing--and today writing from Gaza--speaks powerfully and eloquently to events of the day. Writing stings of the scope and magnitude of loss, of determination for survival, anger that such a crime could be committed in plain sight, and love- for what is lost, for what remains, and for the inevitable future.

Nora Parr is a Research Fellow at the University of Birmingham and the Center for Lebanese Studies. She works on Palestinian, Arabic, and Postcolonial literature. She leads the Palestine Case Study with the Rights for Time research network, and with her project partner the Palestine Trauma Center in Gaza, is working to offer expanded definitions of trauma that can speak better to ongoing experiences of harm. Her first bookNovel Palestine: Nation through the works of Ibrahim Nasrallah came out last moth from the University of California Press. Her reading today is from this work.

In a time marked by urgency, scarcity, resilience and hope for Gaza, Arab Women Artist Now (AWAN) in collaboration with Architects for Gaza will bring together architects from the Arab world showcasing innovative approaches to challenge the colonial erasure of the city and offer an alternative expression in architecture that can capture and revive the identity and memory of this coastal city.

While the exhibition reconstructs the reality of the besieged fractured Gazan landscape, Arab women architects employ architecture, drawings and visual media as tools to narrate, heal and re-read the city.

With a foot on earth and a hand in the sky, the work attempts to reclaim the right to the city and asserts Gazan's right to reclaim their homes.

The recent genocide with its human, spatial, and environmental catastrophe calls for architects to reevaluate their agency and practice. Women Architects for Gaza will bring to the surface the resilient world of Gaza; a world that stands in defiance against the geography of exclusion that has been enforced on it. It is a world where the power of the everyday with its rituals and practices, can cultivate small changes.

Certified in social therapy and performing art from New York and London, Sabine brings years of international experience, combining therapy techniques with clowning and storytelling.

Sally Souraya is a Lebanese multidisciplinary artist and performer based in London. Sally combines performance and activism as catalysts to raise awareness and promote social change. A member of Clown Me In since 2014, Sally has actively participated in various clowning initiatives, as both a performer and trainer, advocating for health, political, and environmental justice.

Clown Me In is a social clowning group established in 2008, spreading laughter, fighting inequality, and facilitating healing in communities and humanitarian settings through the power of art and play. Providing workshops, performances, and artivism campaigns, Clown Me In's vision is to empower people, encourage dialogue between communities, and advocate for social change and justice, in Lebanon and globally.

This workshop is led by Dr. Shrehan Lynch, a British Palestinian and a Senior Lecturer in Sport at the University of East London (UEL). Shrehan's research has explored how movement (physical education, physical activity, and sport) has notoriously been socially unjust and has worked to amplify the ways to make movement more socially just through her network Socially Just Physical Education & Youth Sport. In her former role of training physical education teachers at UEL, she taught through a sociocultural approach where students were encouraged to create physical education lessons based on fun, culturally relevant activities, and would be wholly inclusive of every student.

The workshop will firstly explore participants own experiences in movement, these might be positive, negative or both! Dr Shrehan Lynch will then give a summary of her research and share the art of movement for life. "Tale Tonic" focuses on the paradoxical works of artists Marianne Fahmy and Nada El Kalaawy. The exhibition is characterized by an array of artistic mediums, including paintings, textile designs, and video. Through their respective practices, El Kalaawy and Fahmy move between the metaphorical and literal visualizations, through the construction and deconstruction of cultural motifs, found images, objects, and historical references in their respective practices.

These elements serve as the raw materials for the artists to create hypothetical narratives and storylines within their work. The elicited narratives within the exhibition serve as a platform for an introspective journey, inviting viewers to question and assume. The exhibition aims to put emphasis on the viewer's interpretation, encouraging a personal and subjective engagement with the artworks.

A central thematic focus of the exhibition is challenging longstanding notions of a singular, authoritative interpretation or meaning imposed on perception. El Kalaawy and Fahmy prompt viewers to reflect on how historical references, cultural motifs, and found images contribute to the shaping of our present reality. Inviting audiences to approach the archival material in an unarmored manner, examining and contemplate.

Music is political and has always existed as a form of resistance, especially when other forms of resistance have been silenced. Explore this with LUMA & Nihal over the course of the evening through their sets from Palestine to Sudan with music, soundscapes and field recordings.

LUMA is a British-Iraqi DJ, radio host and club promoter. 


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
